Veteran-Ready vs. Veteran-Friendly: Part 2

There has been and will likely continue to be a great number of post-9/11 student veterans seeking degrees from your institution. According to the <u>Institute for Veterans and Military Families</u> at Syracuse University, nearly 3 million post-9/11 veterans have entered higher education following their service.

Whether you serve a community college, technical college, public 4-year college, or private 4-year college, you are likely to see these students continue to wish to enroll and graduate from your program. I welcome each of you to become familiar with a few simple things you could tell a veteran/active-duty service member regarding your own institution's view of its role in providing their specific educational needs.

I have often viewed higher education as a 2-way street. The institutions provide as much opportunity for the students as is ever sustainable. In exchange, the students provide the institutions with future donors and talents to brag about. Students give life and strife to the professors and staff. They wish to learn! So it is for the student veteran.

The student veteran, too, wishes to contribute to the community in a meaningful way. This unique type of student brings discipline and leadership, with skills in overcoming unforeseen obstacles. This student often has a unique world perspective based on experiences that only a veteran could describe. These are the most unique perspectives for two reasons: There are very few of us that have experienced hostile gunfire, period. Secondly, there are very few of those on our campuses that have experienced it. The reason I say this is a problem is that when these two spheres—military veterans and higher education—do not convene often enough, they lose trust in one another. They lose faith that the other is doing the "right" thing.

I had searched to find a distinction between "veteran-friendly" and "veteran-ready" institutions. I find that schools either make efforts or they don't (can't) make efforts to accommodate veterans.

I suggest that institutions are more "veteran-ready" than others when they participate in some of the following ways:

- \Rightarrow Establish specific points of contact within campus offices.
- \Rightarrow Create a campus working group that spans departments.
- \Rightarrow Collaborate with community organizations to provide comprehensive services.
- \Rightarrow Ensure veterans receive a thorough introduction to the university through an orientation.
- ⇒ Improve campus climate by establishing a student veterans group, educating faculty and staff about veteran-specific issues, and if possible, creating a veteran-specific resource center or designated space.
- \Rightarrow Investigate the possibility of creating veteran-specific learning communities on campus.
- \Rightarrow Streamline disability and veteran services.

Metrics: Are they what they seem?

As admissions officers, institutional researchers, and registrars, we often quote our college's metrics. They sound great and appeal to prospective students, parents, external research partners, and even donors. Is it all created equal, though? Inside Higher Ed writer Scott Jaschik recently interviewed Jerry Z. Muller, author of *The Tyranny of Metrics*, which "critiques not only higher education but many parts of society that rely on metrics."



In the article, Muller says that institutional reliance on metrics often drives self-fulfilling prophecies. One example he gives is the properties of law eccentration which often is tighted

the promotion of low acceptance rates, which often is tied to prestige and institutional rankings. The prestige allures applications, only for admissions teams to reject more applications to meet low acceptance rates, Muller says.

Muller offers a key solution: ensure quality meets quantity through good judgment. In the research arena, for example, quantity of research publications doesn't automatically mean high quality. Are they peer-reviewed articles in critically acclaimed journals? From an admissions and enrollment management perspective, do you accept college-ready students who make it to graduation and beyond? How does your institution accommodate access, retention, and other forms of student success?

Consider how your team, division, and institution reports and uses metrics. Are they tied to your mission and culture? Are they tied to national reporting mandates? Recruits and students will build confidence in your institution as you learn and re-learn meaning behind your numbers.

Advisors: Critical links between admissions, registrar

Advisors play a key role in linking efforts of admissions representatives and registrars. While it's important to enroll students, a recent report from the <u>Center for</u> <u>Community College Student Engagement (CCSSE)</u> says advisors are critical in retaining and graduating students.

Good news is that, nationally, more new students reported that they were required to meet with an advisor this year (73%) than last year (51%). The CCSEE report also says increased frequency and length of advisor visits leads to students exhibiting higher levels of active and collaborative learning, student effort, academic challenge, student-faculty interaction, and support for learners. In short, focused advising leads to more engaged students.

This report addresses advising of student-athletes, developmental students, and transfer-seeking students three major college student populations in Kansas. KS free-speech legislation awaits colleges' weigh-in

While free speech is protected under the U.S. Constitution's Second Amendment, delivery of and reaction to free speech has long been a contentious issue at colleges and universities throughout the U.S.

The Kansas government contemplates a free-speech protection bill, known as the <u>Campus Free Speech Protection</u> <u>Act</u>, "that would prohibit universities from assessing security fees based on anticipated reaction to a speaker," <u>according</u> to the Topeka Capital-Journal.

While some state legislators want to move the bill to law, other legislators want more buy-in from Kansas colleges and universities first. Particularly, Sen. Lynn Rogers seeks more information from the state's colleges and universities that want policies guiding faculty use of social media.

Campus safety is a recurring question from prospective students and parents. Students may feel compelled to express views, while others feel uncomfortable around challenging views. How does your campus address this?

KACRAO scholarships deadline extends to April 1

The KACRAO Scholarship Committee is pleased to announce <u>the Glenn Lygrisse/KACRAO Scholarship application is</u> <u>now live!</u> The application deadline was extended an extra month this year—April 1, 2018.

KACRAO scholarships are available to any current high school senior attending a Kansas high school who has a cumulative, seventh-semester high school GPA of at least 3.25 on a 4-point scale. A student can be one of the four annual recipients of a \$500 Glenn Lygrisse/KACRAO Scholarship! The scholarship must be used at a KACRAO member institution. One \$500 scholarship will be awarded in each of these four categories: four-year public institution, four-year private institution, community college, and technical college.

Please help us get the word out to high school counselors, current high school seniors and parents. Let them know about the KACRAO Scholarship and the upcoming deadline.

An ACT score is no longer a requirement for this scholarship. This will help break down any barriers so that, if a student has not taken the ACT exam and is not required to take it for entrance into his/her chosen college/university, that student will still be eligible to apply for and receive a KACRAO Scholarship.
